

How To Use Archive

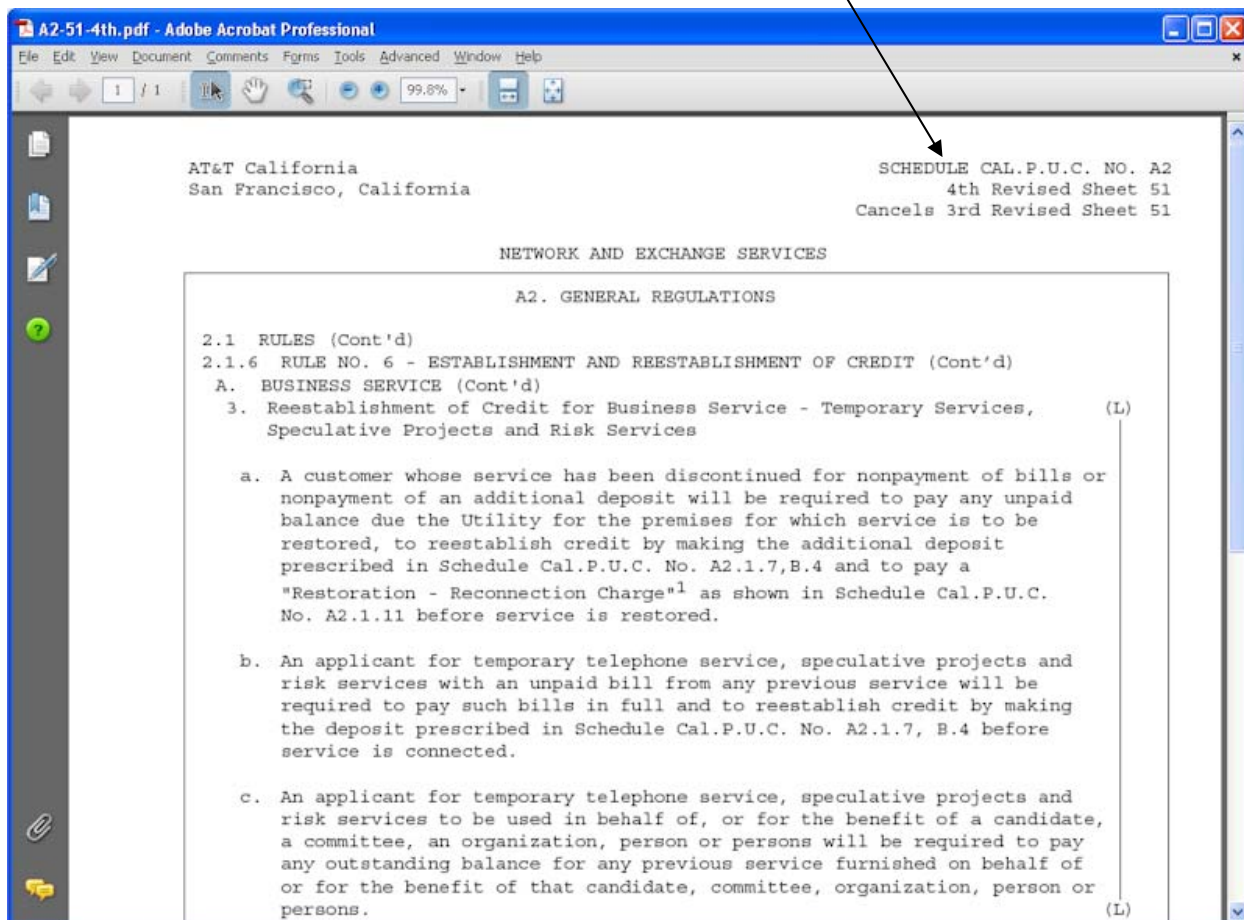
This archive contains cancelled rates, terms, and conditions that apply to services detariffed pursuant to California Public Utilities Commission Decision No. 07-09-018. Current rates, terms, and conditions are available by going to www.att.com/servicepublications, and following the links to the AT&T California Tariff or Guidebook. This archive will contain a rolling three year history of cancelled rates, terms, and conditions beginning with changes made on or after July 15, 2009.

Helpful Information in using Archive

Sheet Numbers and Revision Numbers: Pages, or “sheets,” are numbered sequentially in the top right-hand corner of each sheet. When a new sheet is added between existing sheets with whole numbers, a decimal is added. For example, a new sheet is added between pages 34 and 35, it would be 34.1.

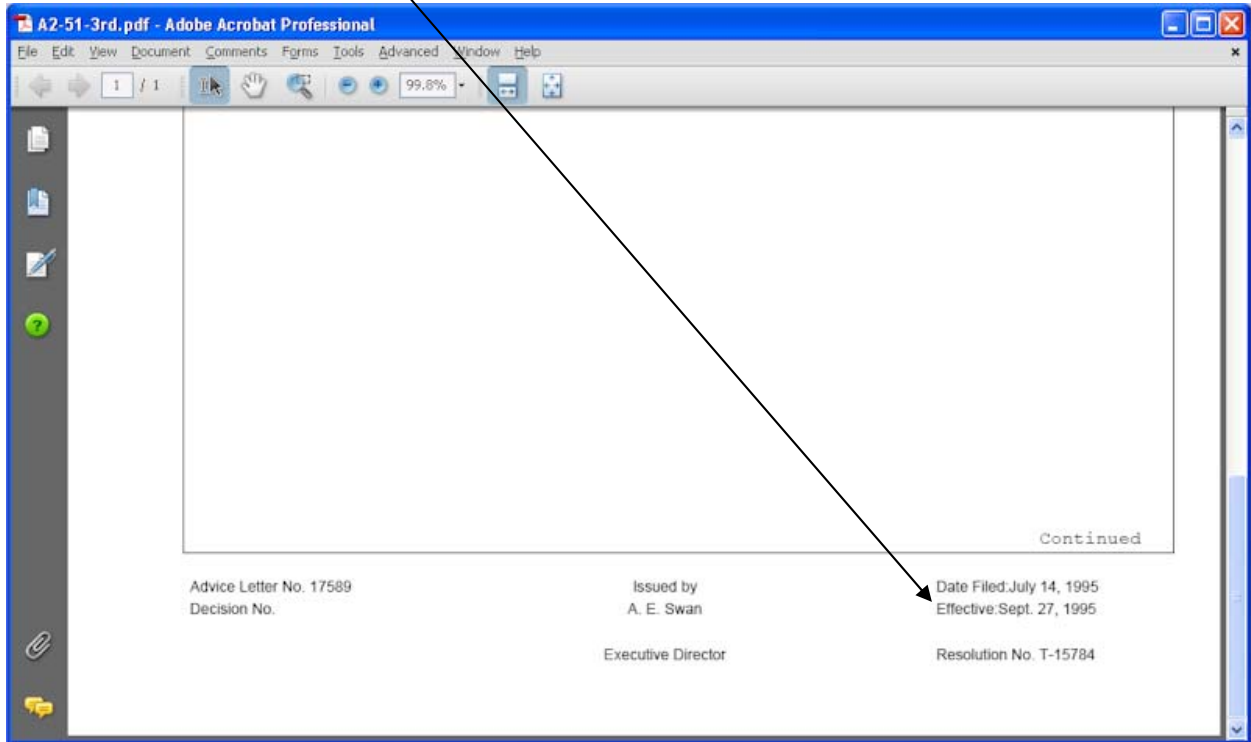
The version or “revision” number of a sheet tells how many times a sheet has been revised over time, and is also located in the top right corner of each sheet.

This example shows the 4th revision of Sheet 51 (the “4th Revised Sheet 51”), which replaces, or “cancels” the previous version of the sheet, the “3rd Revised Sheet 51.”

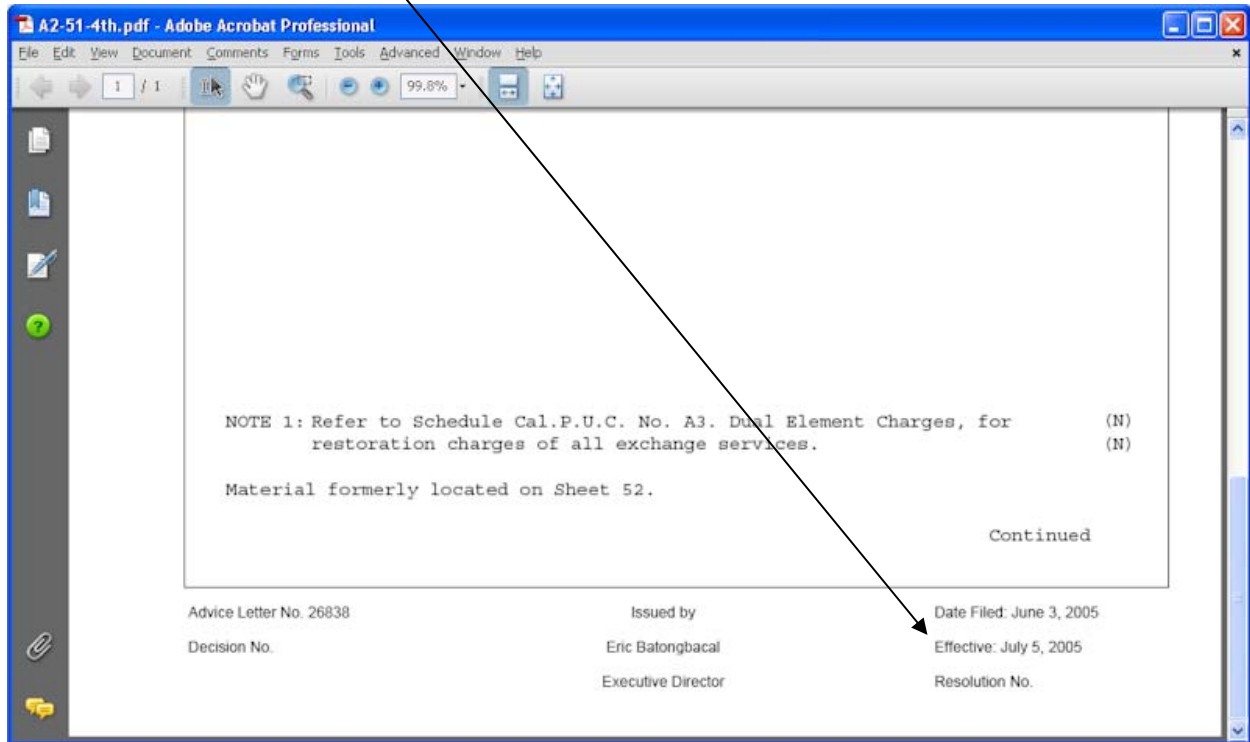


Dates of Effectiveness for Sheets: The bottom right-hand corner of each sheet identifies the beginning date of effectiveness for that sheet. In order to determine the effective date range of any sheet, you need to compare the earlier revision number of that sheet with the next higher revision number. The next higher version of an archived sheet may be the current sheet. For example, if you looked at the 3rd Revised Sheet 51, you would see that its beginning “Effective Date” was September 27, 1995. If you compare that against the 4th Revised Sheet 51, you would see that its beginning “Effective Date” was July 5, 2005. This date range of September 27, 1995 to July 5, 2005 tells you the dates of effectiveness for the 3rd Revised Sheet 51.

Geographic Applicability: Unless otherwise indicated, the geographic applicability of any tariff or guidebook provision is the entire service territory of AT&T California. You may need to refer to tariff or guidebook sheets appearing before or after any particular sheet to provide complete context in order to make this determination.

Revision Symbols: Letters appear along the right-hand side of each sheet next to the line where a revision has been made on a particular sheet versus the prior revision number of that same sheet. Where a horizontal line appears connecting two symbols, revisions have been made throughout that section.

The following revision symbols are used in both tariffs and guidebooks:

- (C) To signify changed listing, rule or regulation which may affect rates or charges
- (D) To signify discontinued material, including listing, rate, rule or regulation
- (I) To signify increase
- (N) To signify new material including listing, rate, rule or regulation
- (R) To signify reduction

The following revision symbols are used in tariffs only:

- (L) To signify material relocated from or to another part of tariff schedules with no change in text, rate, rule or regulation
- (T) To signify change in wording of text but not change in rate, rule or regulation

In the example provided above for the 4th Revised Sheet 51, two (L) symbols appear with a horizontal line connecting them. This indicates that the material in this section was moved from another section of the tariff or guidebook without substantive changes.
